
Collect

Almighty God, whose Son Jesus Christ is the resurrection and the life: raise us, who trust in him, from the death of sin to the life of righteousness, that we may seek those things which are above, where he reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**

First Reading: Acts 9: 36-end: Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, 'Please come to us without delay.' So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, 'Tabitha, get up.' Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This

became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.

Second reading: Revelation 7: 9-end: I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, 'Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!' And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshipped God, singing, 'Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and might be to our God for ever and ever! Amen.' Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, 'Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?' I said to him, 'Sir, you are the one that knows.' Then he said to me, 'These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.'

Gospel Reading: John 10: 22-30: At that time the festival of the Dedication took place in Jerusalem. It was winter, and Jesus was walking in the temple, in the portico of Solomon. So the Jews gathered around him and said to him, 'How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are

the Messiah, tell us plainly.' Jesus answered, 'I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me; but you do not believe, because you do not belong to my sheep. My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. What my Father has given me is greater than all else, and no one can snatch it out of the Father's hand. The Father and I are one.'

Did you know that Truro Cathedral has specific ecclesiastical purposes and that the Chapter (the Board of Trustees) has specific charitable objects?

The ecclesiastical purposes and the charitable objects are set out in church and governmental legislation. They form the main 'lenses', aims, ambitions of our common life and of what we 'do' as we try to serve God and the diverse communities of Cornwall. They are legal requirements and, along with our charitable registration, are the foundations of how we ensure we create real 'public benefit.'

The ecclesiastical purpose of the cathedral is set out as follows:

- the cathedral is the seat of the bishop and a centre of worship and mission; and
- the cathedral provides a focus for the life and work of the Church of England in the diocese.

The charitable objects of the cathedral are:

- to advance the Christian religion in accordance with the faith and practice of the Church of England, in particular by furthering the mission of the Church of England.
- to care for and conserve the fabric and structure of the cathedral church building.
- to advance any other charitable purposes which are ancillary to the furtherance of the purpose referred to in paragraph (a) or (b).

What does 'public benefit' mean?

In England and Wales, we must comply with the following:

- to be a charity we must have only charitable purposes, which must be for the public benefit ('the public benefit requirement')
- to operate as a charity we must carry out its purposes for the public benefit.

• to report on a charity's work - we must report each year on how we have carried out our charity's purposes for the public benefit and confirm that, in doing so, we have had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance where relevant.

Charity trustees have a duty to 'have regard' to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

The public benefit requirement

A charity's 'purpose' is what it is set up to achieve. For an organisation to be a charity, each of its purposes must be for the public benefit. The Charities Act 2011 calls this the 'public benefit requirement'.

The public benefit requirement has two aspects:

The 'benefit aspect'

To satisfy this aspect:

- a purpose must be beneficial in a way that is identifiable and able to be evidenced.
- any detriment or harm that results to people, property or the environment must not outweigh the benefit this is also based on evidence.

The 'public aspect'

To satisfy this aspect, the purpose must:

- benefit the public in general, or a sufficient section of the public.
- not give rise to more than incidental personal benefit.

For a purpose to be a charitable purpose, it must satisfy both the benefit and the public aspects.

Mission of the cathedral

The 2016 vision document set the following as the aims of the cathedral.

- Develop and broaden our worshipping life to offer sacred space for everyone to experience God
- Enable and encourage life-long learning, personal growth and development, exploring the relevance of Christianity to everyday life through education, theology and the arts.
- Develop and broaden our social responsibility by identifying areas of common concern and interest within our communities, and providing a place where these can be explored and supported in a positive and safe environment.

- Enrich our visitor experience by developing meaningful ways for individuals and groups to engage with the cathedral building, its ethos, integrity and values.
- Foster financial sustainability and accountability by growing our resources

Currently, I am working with the Chapter and with the Senior Management Team in refreshing these aims and ambitions and revising them into an achievable action plan for 2025 to 2027. More information will follow in regards of the key aspects of this process of revision.


Please pray for Keiren as he joins us in God's mission here and begins this new ministry amongst us.
