
#### **Collect**

Almighty God, who through your only-begotten Son Jesus Christ have overcome death and opened to us the gate of everlasting life: grant that, as by your grace going before us you put into our minds good desires, so by your continual help we may bring them to good effect; through Jesus Christ our risen Lord, who is alive and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen** 

**First Reading: Acts 11: 1-18:** The apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, 'Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?' Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, 'I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of

the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, "Get up, Peter; kill and eat." But I replied, "By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth." But a second time the voice answered from heaven, "What God has made clean, you must not call profane." This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, "Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved." And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, "John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?' When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, 'Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life.'

# Introducing Sally Piper as our new interim Choir Chaplain.



Many of you will already know Sally Piper who worked for the Diocese for many years. Sally joins us as a volunteer interim Choir Chaplain. Sally introduces herself: I am first and foremost a disciple of Jesus Christ, not a good one, but one who is very aware of her failings and vulnerabilities. I try to pray every day, and read my Bible, and I love exploring scripture on my own and with others. Although much of my formational Christian experience was within the United Reformed Church, I am inspired by the mission of Truro Cathedral to be Sacred Space and Common Ground for the people of Cornwall, those who live, work and visit here and I'm thrilled to be part of a Christian

Community that seeks to be truly inclusive, where each person is valued.

I grew up in Cornwall (attending Truro Grammar School for Girls [now Sainsbury's!]), leaving in 1978 to study Electrical and Electronic Engineering at Bath University. A variety of careers (engineering, sales, marketing and inventory control) in industry followed graduation and in 1999, I returned to Cornwall. For the next 15 years I worked for, established and led charities supporting victims of crime, especially sexual violence and domestic abuse. It was during this time that I learnt the importance of listening well, of coming alongside people; not seeking to advise or counsel but just being with them in whatever they were going through.

In 2015, I joined the Church House team of the Diocese of Truro as Head of Ministry, leading the wonderful team which supports, and equips for ministry and mission, our clergy, lay ministers and parishes. I co-led several of our lay ministry courses and facilitated Reflective Practice Groups for lay and ordained ministers. I retired from this role in December 2024.

I'm a member of Treslothan Church, near Camborne where I serve as a Licensed Lay Minister (Reader). In 2018, I completed my Diploma in Theology with SWMTC and was honoured to be appointed as a non-residentiary Lay Canon of Truro Cathedral. My stall is that of St Jude – the Patron Saint of desperate situations and lost causes - among other things!

I'm married to Mark, and we have a Golden Retriever called Bella. Now retired, I'm delighted to be able to give much more time to my favourite activities: gardening, walking with Bella, listening to classical music, going to concerts and reading.

# Did you know that Truro Cathedral has specific ecclesiastical purposes and that the Chapter (the Board of Trustees) has specific charitable objects?

The ecclesiastical purposes and the charitable objects are set out in church and governmental legislation. They form the main 'lenses', aims, ambitions of our common life and of what we 'do' as we try to serve God and the diverse communities of Cornwall. They

are legal requirements and, along with our charitable registration, are the foundations of how we ensure we create real 'public benefit.'

# The ecclesiastical purpose of the cathedral is set out as follows:

- the cathedral is the seat of the bishop and a centre of worship and mission; and
- the cathedral provides a focus for the life and work of the Church of England in the diocese.

# The charitable objects of the cathedral are:

- to advance the Christian religion in accordance with the faith and practice of the Church of England, in particular by furthering the mission of the Church of England.
- to care for and conserve the fabric and structure of the cathedral church building.
- to advance any other charitable purposes which are ancillary to the furtherance of the purpose referred to in paragraph (a) or (b).

## What does 'public benefit' mean?

In England and Wales, we must comply with the following:

- to be a charity we must have only charitable purposes, which must be for the public benefit ('the public benefit requirement')
- to operate as a charity we must carry out its purposes for the public benefit.
- to report on a charity's work we must report each year on how we have carried out our charity's purposes for the public benefit and confirm that, in doing so, we have had regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance where relevant.

Charity trustees have a duty to 'have regard' to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

# The public benefit requirement

A charity's 'purpose' is what it is set up to achieve. For an organisation to be a charity, each of its purposes must be for the public benefit. The Charities Act 2011 calls this the 'public benefit requirement'.

The public benefit requirement has two aspects:

## The 'benefit aspect'

To satisfy this aspect:

- a purpose must be beneficial in a way that is identifiable and able to be evidenced.
- any detriment or harm that results to people, property or the environment must not outweigh the benefit this is also based on evidence.

# The 'public aspect'

To satisfy this aspect, the purpose must:

- benefit the public in general, or a sufficient section of the public.
- not give rise to more than incidental personal benefit.

For a purpose to be a charitable purpose, it must satisfy both the benefit and the public aspects.

#### **Mission of the cathedral**

The 2016 vision document set the following as the aims of the cathedral.

- Develop and broaden our worshipping life to offer sacred space for everyone to experience God
- Enable and encourage life-long learning, personal growth and development, exploring the relevance of Christianity to everyday life through education, theology and the arts.
- Develop and broaden our social responsibility by identifying areas of common concern and interest within our communities, and providing a place where these can be explored and supported in a positive and safe environment.
- Enrich our visitor experience by developing meaningful ways for individuals and groups to engage with the cathedral building, its ethos, integrity and values.
- Foster financial sustainability and accountability by growing our resources

Currently, I am working with the Chapter and with the Senior Management Team in refreshing these aims and ambitions and revising them into an achievable action plan for 2025 to 2027. More information will follow in regards of the key aspects of this process of revision.


Keiren comes to us from Treliske hospital where he is part of the chaplaincy team.
