First Reading - Jer 31: 31 – 34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the LORD', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Second reading - Heb 5: 5 – 10

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten you'; as he says also in another place, 'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.'

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Gospel Reading - John 12: 20 – 33

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, 'Sir, we wish to see Jesus.' Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honour.'

'Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—"Father, save me from this hour"? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name.' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.' The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, 'An angel has spoken to him.' Jesus answered, 'This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgement of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

The candidates reply

With the help of God, I will.

The Candidates receive their surplices and the Dean says

We give you this surplice as a sign of your membership of the Choir and of your calling to lead the worship of God in this place.

The Chorister Mentor gives the candidates a copy of the Psalter, and the Dean says

Sing, rejoice and be glad: what you sing with your lips may you believe in your hearts, and show forth in your lives.

The Dean addresses each candidate in turn, saying

Logan ... Tom Luca ... Sebastian I admit you to the Choir of this Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Truro, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

All Amen.

When all have been admitted, the Dean says the following prayer

Almighty God, you have given us hearts to love you and voices to praise you: send your blessing on these your servants whom you have called to minister before you in your church: grant them your grace, that they may lead your praises with reverence and with joy, and serve you faithfully all their lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Next Sunday, 24th March, is Palm Sunday. If you are able, please meet at the top of Pydar Street (outside TK Max) to begin the service with the blessing of palms and procession into the Cathedral (with donkey, we hope!). If you prefer to await the arrival of the procession within the Cathedral itself, please arrive there at the usual time and there will be a ceremony to bless the palms of those in the building before the procession arrives.

Internal renovation work in St Mary's Aisle begins this week. In order to minimise disturbance to daily services, **both 9.00am Holy Communion AND 9.30 am Morning Prayer will relocate to the Jesus Chapel, as will the Friday 11.00am BCP Holy Communion service** until the work in St Mary's Aisle is complete (probably end of May). If evening prayer is said at 4pm, that will also take place in the Jesus Chapel. Choral evensong will not be affected.

Thursday Organ Recitals

After careful deliberation, organ recitals are now planned to run on **Thursday** lunchtimes, rather than Fridays, as previously. This has enabled us to include a greater number of recitals than in previous years and we hope as many people as possible will take advantage of these uplifting and peaceful oases in the middle of their busy days.

During Lent, there will be the opportunity to pray in the cathedral early morning from 08:00-08:30, when the cathedral has a particularly special and 'still' feeling.
