From the Canon Precentor

'Speak Lord, for your servant is listening' - some words from our Old Testament reading this morning. Does God speak? If so, to what extent do we listen? Are we open to receiving God's word and his purpose for us or are we spiritually deaf when it suits us, or even hard of hearing when we suspect that what is being asked of us goes against the grain and challenges all that we have ever held dear? This reading is often read at services associated with 'calling' and 'vocation' and I find the words extremely moving.

Throughout my years in ministry I have met a few people who have followed what they thought was God's call, entered the ministry, only some years later to have realised that, perhaps through a fit of enthusiasm at the time, had realised that they were mistaken and went on to follow a different vocational path for their life. Some had even, because of tragedy or the stresses of modern life and ministry lost their faith. Conversely, I have also met a few people who felt a deep sense of calling to the priesthood and did nothing about it, or left it too late and the business of life has taken over and they lived with a sense of regret ever since. Sometimes God speaks in the almost miraculous, and sometimes, as with the prophet Elijah (1 Kings 19:12) his message and purpose is conveyed via a 'still small voice'.

Do you have a sense of Groundhog Day as we enter a third lockdown? Maybe yes, and maybe no. There is definitely a sense of 'we've been here before' along with a renewed feeling of anxiety as Coronavirus infection rates rise – this time even in our locality. Fortunately, we are not bound to constantly re-live the pandemic in an ever spinning vicious circle; and we give thanks for our scientists and medics and that a vaccination programme is currently underway – there is an end in sight! Until then, please stay safe and well and be assured of the prayers of all at the cathedral.

Some people have posed the question of 'Where is God in all this?' This is a challenge to all people of faith. 'Speak Lord, for your servant is listening'. Perhaps our current situation calls upon us to consider afresh health, sickness and disability. Perhaps we are confronted with issues of neighbourliness, mortality, our relationship with life and death, science and research, the availability of worldwide healthcare and the consideration and care we ought to have for each other. Perhaps our current situation calls us also to realistically consider our relationship with,

and treatment of the environment. It probably also calls all people of faith to reconsider the place of faith in our world in times of global anxiety. All these are surely pressing issues, and there is no easy answer. 'Speak Lord, for your servant is listening.'

The Liturgy of the Word

First Reading

1 Samuel 3: 1-10

A reading from the first book of Samuel.

The boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' and he said, 'Here I am!' and ran to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.'

But he said, 'I did not call; lie down again.' So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, 'Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' But he said, 'I did not call, my son; lie down again.' Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up and went to Eli, and said, 'Here I am, for you called me.' Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, 'Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening." ' So Samuel went and lay down in his place. Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' And Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.'

This is the word of the Lord.

Second Reading **Revelation 5: 1-10**

A reading from the revelation to St John the divine.

I saw in the right hand of the one seated on the throne a scroll written on the inside and on the back, sealed with seven seals; and I saw a mighty angel proclaiming with a loud voice, 'Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals?' And no one in heaven or on earth or under the earth was able to open the scroll or to look into it. And I began to weep bitterly because no one was found worthy to open the scroll or to look into it. Then one of the elders said to me, 'Do not weep. See, the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Root of David, has conquered, so that he can open the scroll and its seven seals.' Then I saw between the throne and the four living creatures and among the elders a Lamb standing as if it had been slaughtered, having seven horns and seven eyes, which are the seven spirits of God sent out into all the earth. He went and took the scroll from the right hand of the one who was seated on the throne. When he had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fell before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. They sing a new song: 'You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slaughtered and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and people and nation; you have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign on earth.'
