The Archdeacon of Canterbury and Bishop David arrive at the West Doors led by the Vesturer of Canterbury. The bishop's entry is announced by an organ flourish, and the congregation turns to face the party. The Bishop knocks upon the door.

Children from Truro diocesan schools (Florence, Frankie, Emily and Scarlett) say to the Bishop:

**We greet you in the name of the holy and undivided Trinity.
Who are you, and why do you request entry?**

The Archdeacon responds

I bring to you David Williams to be installed as Bishop of Truro.

Children (addressing the Bishop): **Why have you been sent to us?**

I am David, a servant of Jesus Christ,
and I come as one sent as Bishop to serve you,
as one to proclaim the love of Christ,
and with you to worship and love him with heart and soul,
mind and strength.

Children: **How do you come among us
and with what confidence?**

I come knowing nothing except Jesus Christ and him crucified and in
weakness and fear and in much trembling.

Children: **Let us then humble ourselves before God
and together seek his mercy and strength.**

Choir anthem

The Reading of the Mandate

At the podium the Archdeacon of Canterbury says to the Dean
Mr Dean, I bring you greetings from his Grace,
the Lord Archbishop of York and present you with his mandate.

The Dean replies

Mr Archdeacon, we welcome you to this Cathedral Church, and thank
you for bringing greetings from Stephen, our Most Reverend Father
in God.

*The Dean then receives the mandate and hands it to the Chancellor of
the Diocese, saying*

Let the Archbishop's mandate be read.

*The Chancellor of the Diocese reads the mandate and hands it back to
the Dean who returns it to the Archdeacon of Canterbury.*

The Dean continues

Colleagues of the Chapter, you have heard the Archbishop's
Mandate. Let us proceed to fulfil it, praising God for all his mercies
and praying for his blessing upon David our Bishop and upon his
ministry among us.

The Collect

Please kneel or remain seated.

The Dean says

God, who as at this time
taught the hearts of your faithful people
by sending to them the light of your Holy Spirit:
grant us, by the same Spirit,
to have a right judgement in all things
and evermore to rejoice in his holy comfort;
through the merits of Christ Jesus our Saviour,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Preparation and Anointing

The Choir sings "Jubilate" by Russell Pascoe (b. 1960)

O be joyful in the Lord, all ye lands : serve the Lord with gladness,
and come before his presence with a song.
Be ye sure that the Lord he is God :
it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves;
we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.
O go your way into his gates with thanksgiving,
and into his courts with praise :
be thankful unto him, and speak good of his name.
For the Lord is gracious, his mercy is everlasting :
and his truth endureth from generation to generation.

*The Reverend Helen Byrne, Chaplain of Truro School, anoints the
forehead of the Bishop with the Oil of Chrism saying*

Remember that at your baptism
you were signed with the cross of Christ.
Rejoice in God's goodness and grace
and remain faithful to him,
walking with us in the life of the Spirit.
May God give you grace to continue in his way.
The Lord keep you and defend you
now and for ever. **Amen.**

Andrew Samson of Grace Church anoints the Bishop's left hand, saying

Remember that when you were ordained deacon
in the Church of God
you were called to share in the ministry of Christ
who took the form of a servant,
and came not to be served but to serve.

Seek and serve Christ in all people,
loving your neighbour as yourself.
May God give you grace to continue in his way.
The Lord keep you and defend you
now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Archdeacon of Bodmin anoints the Bishop's right hand, saying
Remember that when you were ordained priest
in the Church of God
you were given care of the people in your charge:
to watch over them,
to absolve them and to bless them in God's name,
and to proclaim the gospel of salvation.
May God give you grace to continue in his way.
The Lord keep you and defend you
now and for ever. **Amen.**

The Archdeacon of Cornwall says
Remember that the ring you wear on your right hand
is a sign of authority.
It is also a sign of trust
that the waiting father
places on the finger of his returning son.
May God give you grace to continue in his way.
The Lord keep you and defend you
now and for ever. **Amen.**

A Bard of the Gorsedh Kernow prays in Cornish

according to the mandate of the Archbishop of York.

The Enthronement

Holding the Archbishop's Mandate,

the Archdeacon of Canterbury places the Bishop in the Cathedra, saying

By virtue of the Mandate of the Most Reverend Father in God
Stephen Geoffrey Cottrell by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of
York, I William Jonathan Adam, Archdeacon of The Cathedral and
Metropolitan Church of Christ in Canterbury, induct and install you,
David Grant Williams into possession of the Bishopric of Truro
with its rights and dignities and all its opportunities
for service; and I place you (*here the Bishop is seated*) in the episcopal
seat of this Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Truro
in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

The Archdeacons stand before the Bishop, holding the stole, cope and mitre.

The Archdeacon of Bodmin, holding up the stole, says

Jesus said, 'Take my yoke upon you and learn of me.'
Wear this stole as a token of your obedience to Christ,
whose yoke is easy and whose burden is light.

The Bishop of St Germans, holding up the cope, says

St Paul says 'As many as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ.' Wear this cope as a sign that you are clothed with Christ, in whose strength alone you stand among us.

The Archdeacon of Cornwall, holding up the mitre, says
St Luke tells us that at Pentecost, tongues of flame rested on each one of the Apostles. Wear this mitre as a sign that the Holy Spirit rests upon you, and is to be your guide and wisdom in all things.

The Bishop, addressing the whole congregation, says
My sisters and brothers, you have heard the pattern of leadership given to us by our Lord Jesus Christ.
Will you pray for me now and in the days to come,
that I may know God's grace in the task which lies before me,
and do all in his strength?
With the help of God, we will.

Whilst the Bishop is clothed, the Choir sings

Let holy charity mine outward vesture be,
and lowliness become mine inner clothing;
true lowliness of heart,
which takes the humbler part,
and o'er its own shortcomings weeps with loathing.

The pastoral staff is brought forward from the altar and presented to the Bishop by the Dean, Harley, Florence and James.

James says to the Bishop
Bishop David, you are our chief shepherd.
Carry this staff as a sign of your care for us in Christ.
May the Lord be your Shepherd always.

The Dean then presents the Bishop to the people
I present to you David, anointed and installed as our Bishop.

All in the Cathedral greet the Bishop with applause.

The Second Reading

John 10:11-18

Read by Mrs Helen Williams

'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'
