




To remember the lives of children who have died

About this Service

We warmly welcome you all to this Service of Remembrance with all that you bring. The first of these services was held in the cathedral nearly thirty years ago in 1995. As you enter the cathedral you will be given a candle. These will be lit shortly after the service begins and then offered up in an act of remembrance towards the end of the service.

If the name of the child you have come to remember is not already in the Remember our Child Book, but you would like them to be remembered by name in the service, please fill in one of the blue forms that can be obtained from the Lay Assistants at the back of the Nave. Please return this form to a Lay Assistant before the start of the service so that your child's name can be added to the list of names to be read out during the Act of Remembrance.

You can also use this form to have your child's name added to the Remember Our Child Book of Remembrance so that your child will be remembered every year on the anniversary of their death at our quiet 9am Holy Communion service. The cathedral will write to you to acknowledge when your child's name has been added to the book, and will keep you informed about future Remember Our Child services.

After the service you are welcome to sit quietly in the Boer War chapel by the main West entrance and refreshments will be served in the Chapter House, accessed by the North door.

The date of next years' service
will be Sunday 11th May 2025 at 2pm.

The Lighting of the Candles

Remember me when I am gone away,

Second Reading

Luke 2. 8-19

read by Revd Dom Whiting, Hospital Chaplain
A reading from the Gospel according to Luke.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the

angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven,

and on earth peace among those whom he favours!' When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us.' So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart.

This is the word of the Lord.

Cathedral to the Podium.*

The Book of Remembrance is offered to God as we commend them to God's continuing love and care.

The names of the lost children are read.

Following this, Canon Alan says the following prayer.

Lord of all, we pray for the souls of the faithful departed
that they may rest in peace.

We praise you for all who have entered into their rest
and reached the promised land where you are seen
face to face.

Give us grace to follow in their footsteps
as they followed in the way of your Son.

Thank you for the memory of those you have called to
yourself:

by each memory, turn our hearts from things seen
to things unseen,

and lead us till we come to the eternal rest
you have prepared for your people,
through Jesus Christ our Lord.
