ABOUT THIS SERVICE

Welcome to Truro Cathedral and to this service in which the Bishop of St Germans will ordain six people to the office of Deacon. The word $\delta_{1}\alpha\kappa\sigma\sigma\sigma\zeta$ (diakonos) means 'servant', and the diaconate is one of the historic orders of the universal church. Deacons were appointed to assist the apostles in their ministry in earliest days, freeing the apostles for their distinctive work of preaching and teaching by taking on some of the administrative and practical support of the community. More significantly, their ministry embodies that of Christ himself 'who came not to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many', as today's gospel reading tells us.

During the service, shortly after each of the candidates has been ordained, the Bishop washes the feet of each of the newly-ordained, as Jesus washed the feet of his disciples at the Last Supper (John 13:1-15). Here is a dramatic sign of their being enrolled into Jesus' ministry of service, a ministry which they share with their Bishop. As they rise, each is vested with a stole worn over the left shoulder, which is distinctive to the office of deacon.

The service continues with the liturgy of the sacrament of Holy Communion. At the end, the Bishop leads out his newly ordained deacons, in mission and service.

Communion will be distributed at various places within the Cathedral. Please follow the directions of the Lay Assistants. Gluten free hosts are available at the front of the nave. Please have a word with a verger before the service if you require gluten free.

All who usually receive Holy Communion in their own church are warmly invited to do so today. If you would prefer to receive a blessing, please bow your head as a signal to the minister.

During the service, the Archdeacon will confirm that the candidates have taken the necessary oaths and made the Declaration of Assent. The text of this Declaration, together with its Preface, is printed below.

Preface

The Church of England is part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church, worshipping the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds, which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation. Led by the Holy Spirit, it has borne witness to Christian truth in its historic formularies, the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion, The Book of Common Prayer and the Ordering of Bishops, Priests and Deacons. In the declaration you are about to make, will you affirm your loyalty to this inheritance of faith as your inspiration and guidance under God in bringing the grace and truth of Christ to this generation and making Him known to those in your care?

Declaration of Assent

I, A B, do so affirm, and accordingly declare my belief in the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness; and in public prayer and administration of the sacraments, I will use only the forms of service which are authorized or allowed by Canon. The Bishop of St Germans greets the people.

Introduction and Prayers of Penitence

The Bishop of St Germans welcomes all present, introduces the service and calls everyone to repentance.

God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light.

The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the coming of his kingdom.

To serve this royal priesthood, God has given a variety of ministries. Deacons are ordained so that the people of God may be better equipped to make Christ known. Theirs is a life of visible self-giving. Christ is the pattern of their calling and their commission; as he washed the feet of his disciples, so they must wash the feet of others. But first, let us remember that we are all unworthy of Our Lord's calling and to minister in his name.

Please sit

A period of silence is kept after which all say

Almighty God, All our heavenly Father, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour in thought and word and deed, through negligence, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault. We are truly sorry and repent of all our sins. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us, forgive us all that is past and grant that we may serve you in newness of life to the glory of your name. Amen.

The Bishop says:

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect. For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus and said, 'Master, we should like you to do us a favour.' 'What is it you want me to do?' he asked. They answered, 'Grant us the right to sit in state with you, one at your right and the other at your left.' Jesus said to them, 'You do not understand what you are asking. Can you drink the cup that I drink, or be baptised with the baptism I am baptised with?' 'We can', they answered. Jesus said, 'The cup that I drink you shall drink, and the baptism I am baptized with shall be your baptism; but to sit at my right or left is not for me to grant; it is for those to whom it has already been assigned.' Sermon The Dean, the Very Revd Roger Bush

At the end of the sermon all remain seated, standing when the Bishop stands.

The Creed

We believe in one God, All the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The congregation sits and those to be ordained remain standing

The Liturgy of Ordination The Presentation

The Archdeacon presents each ordinand to the Bishop of St Germans, saying

Reverend Father in God, I present N. to be ordained to the office of deacon in the Church of God; he/she is to serve in the parish(es) of N.

As each ordinand is presented they stand facing the congregation.

The Bishop asks the Diocesan Director of Ordinands

Have those whose duty it is to know these ordinands and examine them found them to be of godly life and sound learning? The Diocesan Director of Ordinands replies

They have.

The Bishop asks

Do they believe them to be duly called to serve God in this ministry?

The Diocesan Director of Ordinands replies

They do.

The ordinands turn to face the Bishop who says

Do you believe that God is calling you to this ministry?

The ordinands reply

I do so believe.

The Bishop says

I invite the archdeacon to confirm that the ordinands have taken the necessary oaths and made the Declaration of Assent.

The Archdeacon replies

They have duly taken the Oath of Allegiance to the Sovereign and the Oath of Canonical Obedience to the Bishop. They have affirmed and declared their belief in 'the faith which is revealed in the Holy Scriptures and set forth in the catholic creeds and to which the historic formularies of the Church of England bear witness'.

The Declarations

The ordinands stand before the Bishop, and the congregation remains seated.

The Bishop addresses the congregation

Deacons are called to work with the Bishop and the priests with whom they serve as heralds of Christ's kingdom. They are to proclaim the gospel in word and deed, as agents of God's purposes of love. They are to serve the community in which they are set, bringing to the Church the needs and hopes of all the people. They are to work with their fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely, and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible. Deacons share in the pastoral ministry of the Church and in leading God's people in worship. They preach the word and bring the needs of the world before the Church in intercession. They accompany those searching for faith and bring them to baptism. They assist in administering the sacraments; they distribute communion and minister to the sick and housebound.

Deacons are to seek nourishment from the Scriptures; they are to study them with God's people, that the whole Church may be equipped to live out the gospel in the world. They are to be faithful in prayer, expectant and watchful for the signs of God's presence, as he reveals his kingdom among us.

The Bishop addresses the ordinands directly

We trust that you are fully determined, by the grace of God, to give yourself wholly to his service, that you may draw his people into that new life which God has prepared for those who love him.

And now, in order that we may know your mind and purpose, you must make the declarations we put to you.

Do you accept the Holy Scriptures as revealing all things necessary for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ?

Ordinands I do so accept them.

Will you be diligent in prayer, in reading Holy Scripture, and in all studies that will deepen your faith and fit you to bear witness to the truth of the gospel?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Do you believe the doctrine of the Christian faith as the Church of England has received it, and in your ministry will you expound and teach it?

Ordinands I believe it and will so do.

Will you strive to make the love of Christ known through word and example, and have a particular care for those in need?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you be a faithful servant in the household of God, after the example of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you endeavour to fashion your own life and that of your household according to the way of Christ, that you may be a pattern and example to Christ's people?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you work with your fellow servants in the gospel for the sake of the kingdom of God?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you accept the discipline of this Church, and give due respect to those in authority?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

Will you then, in the strength of the Holy Spirit, continually stir up the gift of God that is in you, to grow in holiness and grace?

Ordinands By the help of God, I will.

The congregation **stands** and the ordinands turn to face them.

The Bishop says to the congregation

Brothers and sisters, you have heard how great is the charge that these ordinands are ready to undertake, and you have heard their declarations. Is it now your will that they should be ordained?

All It is.

Will you continually pray for them?

All We will.

Will you uphold and encourage them in their ministry?

All We will.

The ordinands turn back to face the Bishop, who continues, addressing them

In the name of our Lord we bid you remember the greatness of the trust in which you are now to share: the ministry of Christ himself, who for our sake took the form of a servant. Remember always with thanksgiving that the people among whom you will minister are made in God's image and likeness. In serving them you are serving Christ himself, before whom you will be called to account.

You cannot bear the weight of this calling in your own strength, but only by the grace and power of God. Pray therefore that your heart may daily be enlarged and your understanding of the Scriptures enlightened.

Pray earnestly for the gift of the Holy Spirit.

All kneel and a time of silence is kept.

The Litany

The Bishop introduces the prayers for the ordinands and for the ministry of the whole Church.

In the power of the Spirit and in union with Christ, let us pray to the Father.

We pray for all who are called to differing ministry within the Church; those called to be prophets, those who teach, for benefactors and for generosity in giving. We pray for all who minister in Christ's name and especially for Philip our Bishop, Hugh our suffragan bishop and for the work of our diocese.

All Let my cry, let my cry, let my cry come before you, O Lord.

Father, pour out your blessing upon Rory, Lisa, Christopher, Jess, Penelope and Antony to be ordained deacon; may they faithfully serve you as agents of your love in proclaiming the Gospel, by assisting in the administration of the sacraments, by their preaching and teaching, by ministering to the poor and vulnerable, and visiting and comforting those who are sick, disabled and housebound. We pray also for the parishes in which they will serve.

All Let my cry, let my cry, let my cry come before you, O Lord.

The Bishop concludes the Intercessions by saying

Heavenly Father, we thank you for the gift of your word. May it be a lantern to our feet, a light upon our paths, and a strength to our lives. Take us and use us to love and serve all people in the power of the Holy Spirit and in the name of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

All **Amen.**

The congregation and ordinands remain kneeling.

The Ordination Prayer

The Bishop stretches out his hands towards the ordinands, and says

We praise and glorify you, almighty Father, because in your infinite love you have formed throughout the world a holy people for your own possession, a royal priesthood, a universal Church.

We praise and glorify you because you sent your only Son Jesus Christ to take the form of a slave; he humbled himself for our sake, and in obedience accepted death, even death on a cross. We praise and glorify you because in every age you send your Spirit to fill those whom you have chosen, to equip your holy people for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ.

And now we give you thanks that you have called these your servants, whom we ordain in your name, to share as deacons in the ministry of the gospel of Christ, who came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.

Therefore, Father, through Christ our Lord we pray:

The Bishop lays his hands on the head of each ordinand, and says

Send down the Holy Spirit on your servant Rory, Lisa, Christopher, Jess, Penelope, Antony for the office and work of a deacon in your Church.

When the Bishop has laid hands on all of them, he continues

Through your Spirit, heavenly Father, give these your servants grace and power to fulfil their ministry. Make them faithful to serve and constant in advancing your gospel in the world. May they follow the example of Jesus Christ your Son, who washed the feet of his disciples, and set the needs of others before his own. May their life be disciplined and holy, their words declare your love and their actions reveal your glory, that your people may walk with them in the way of truth and be made ready for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ; to whom, with you and your Holy Spirit, belong glory and honour, worship and praise, now and for ever.

All **Amen.**

Please remain seated

The Washing of Feet

The Bishop rises, lays aside his chasuble and girds himself with a towel. He pours water into a basin, and kneeling before each newly ordained deacon, he washes their feet, the sign Jesus gave his disciples at the Last Supper that they were enrolled in his ministry of service. Then a stole is placed over the left shoulder of each deacon by the Archdeacon.

During the washing of feet the hymn is sung.

When the Bishop has taken his place, he says

When Jesus had washed the disciples' feet, he said to them: 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord, and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Truly, truly, I say to you, a servant is not greater than his master; nor is he who is sent greater than he who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them.'

The Giving of the Bible

The Bishop gives the Bible to each newly-ordained deacon, saying

Rory, Lisa, Christopher, Jess, Penelope, Antony, receive this book. This is a sign of the authority given you this day to speak God's word to his people. Build them up in his truth and serve them in his name.

Please stand

The Welcome

The newly ordained and vested deacons turn to face the congregation and the Bishop says

We preach not ourselves but Christ Jesus as Lord and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake.

All We welcome you as fellow servants in the gospel: may Christ dwell in your hearts through faith, that you may be rooted and grounded in love.

The congregation greets the new deacons with applause.

The Liturgy of the Eucharist The Peace

The Bishop introduces the Peace with this sentence

We are all one in Christ Jesus. We belong to him through faith, heirs of the promise of the Spirit of peace.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.AllAnd also with you.

The deacon says

Although he was their teacher and their Lord, he washed the feet of his disciples and commanded us to do the same, that we might reveal the power of your love, made perfect in our human weakness. Lord, you are holy indeed, the source of all holiness; grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit, and according to your holy will, these gifts of bread and wine may be to us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ; who, in the same night that he was betrayed,

took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me. In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

The deacon says

Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again.
